Answers

Question 1

Correct answer: B. The students' home background and upbringing.

→ Academic outcomes are influenced most strongly by family factors such as income and parents' education level, not by the school type or teaching quality.

Question 2

Correct answer: A. State school students may outperform those from elite schools.

→ Research shows that public school students often do better at university than elite school students with the same entry scores.

Question 3

Correct answer: C. The ability to move comfortably in influential social settings.

→ Elite schools help students develop a sense of belonging and ease in formal or influential environments — often described as "cultural capital."

Question 4

Correct answer: C. The ability to carry themselves with purpose and authority.

 \rightarrow Some parents choose elite schools not for academic reasons, but to help their children develop leadership traits and social presence.

Question 5

Correct answer: A. Whether former students gained more social standing.

→ The researchers compared today's elite school graduates to those from 40 years ago to see whether their access to high-status roles had changed.

Question 6

Correct answer: B. A growing share went to elite school graduates.

→ The proportion of Rhodes scholarships awarded to elite school graduates increased significantly over four decades.

Question 7

Correct answer: A. More went to former elite school students over time.

 \rightarrow The share of Australia's top national honours awarded to elite school graduates rose from 47% to 56% in the same period.

Question 8

Correct answer: B. They increasingly dominate unconventional professional fields.

 \rightarrow Elite private school graduates gained influence even in unexpected areas such as professional sports.
